Dues are Past Due – Our dues run from January to December. If you haven't renewed yet, please do so or this will be your last issue of our Newsletter. Our members are our most important asset – we need all of you. You can renew either on line at www.goldfieldhistoricalsociety.com or through the mail (I'm attaching a membership form). If you renew on line, just enter the level of membership you wish. There is not a "renewal" button but rest assured, we know it's a renewal as your name is on our membership list.

High School Update – Utilizing our first phase Nevada Commission for Cultural Centers and Historic Preservation (CCCHP) grant funds, our contractor, Spectra of Pomona, CA, addressed the internal structural issues, which were completed before the roof repair. The flat roof covering (photo below) was replaced by Cooper Roofing of Las Vegas. Both companies did a

The second phase CCCHP grant funds will replace the sloped roof covering. The GHS and our Structural Engineer, Mel Green, are developing the plans and specifications for this work so that the contractor can submit a preliminary budget. We will then submit that budget to the State Historic Preservation Office to generate a Funding Agreement so that the grant funds can be released and we can start the project.

Carla Cloud from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) visited Goldfield on March 20th. She was checking out the CCCHP funded projects on her way south. Our President, John Ekman, showed her through the High School. It was a positive visit. She told us that the State will most likely reimburse us for almost all of the asbestos abatement costs. This was very good news indeed.

Something that has been on our plate for awhile was to have the High School deed transferred to the Goldfield Historical Society since we are a federal non-profit. The transfer from the Goldfield High School Museum Corp. a State non-profit to the Goldfield Historical Society has now been completed.

Donations – John Rudderow & Deana Glatz generously contributed a total of \$3,500. It will be distributed between the Building Fund (\$1,000) and our General Fund (\$2,500). **Andrew and Rosemary Baudino** also contributed \$2,000. **Richard & Paula Salerno** contributed \$1,000. We've received additional donations along with membership renewals ranging from \$10 to \$100 and we appreciate each and every one. All donations help immensely – large or small. We thank you all.

Coleen Garland, one of our lifetime members, has graciously donated part of her book collection. This is very much appreciated. The collection contains books about ghost towns, railroads, rock collecting, Nevada history etc. There are over 250 titles. **John Ekman, Jim Price** and myself boxed and loaded the books. If anyone is interested in viewing the list, please contact me and I'll send you a copy. Thank you so much **Coleen**.

In addition, she donated 7 boxes of older Nevada Magazines. This will greatly enhance our library collection.

And we're not done yet. **Coleen** also donated an antique Anchor Brand folding bench wringer made by the Lovell Manufacturing company as shown below. It has two metal tubs – one for washing and one for rinsing. It'll be a great display item for us. Thank you again **Coleen**.

The display will have to move to the High School and we will need volunteers in April to help with the move. If you can assist, please let us know. "The purpose of this email is to contact your regarding the train that is in the building known as Roaring Camp. I understand that you have been renting the space. I received the title today to the building as I am Al Wheeler's daughter. The purpose of this email is to provide you with 30 days notice that the lease for the area the train is in will no longer be month to month. As of May 1, 2023, I request that you have the space vacated. It is not currently safe for people to be in the building due to the mold. Until that is remediated, there should be no tenants in the building."

Properties Around Town – Goldfield made front page news in the December 29, 2022 issue of the Tonopah Times-Bonanza & Goldfield News. **Peggy Carrasco**, has been working on a secret garden with a grape arbor, a grotto and a seating area for several years. It has come to be known as the Road Less Traveled. She wants it to be a place of respite and reflection for travelers and locals. **Tim Hipp** designed and built the grotto. He also started a Go Fund Me page to help raise the required funds to complete the decades-long project. There are many grottos, chapels named St. Barbara in mining towns around the world as she is the Patron Saint of miners. But none in Goldfield, until now.
