High School Room –The school room is coming along nicely. One of the old venetian blinds has been cleaned, restrung and hung as you can see from the picture. We are having four more done in the “demonstration” class room and hope to be have them up by Goldfield Days. We have received several donations to assist in this effort and we thank you very much. If you wish to donate toward this effort, that would be wonderful. If you'd like to “adopt a blind”, the cost is \$175. As you know, this is just one room and we do not have old blinds for all of the rooms. When we get to that point, we'll have to have new ones made which will be at least double or more what we're paying now. We hope to have the glass replaced in several of the windows too. That hasn't happened yet but we still have a month before Goldfield Days!

High School Restoration – The next phase of our structural restoration is additional repairs of the exterior southwest wall. Our president attended the Commission for Cultural Centers and Historic Preservation (CCCHP) meeting in Carson City and requested \$75,000 for this work. We were awarded \$44,000. We're not exactly sure when this money will be available but we hope soon. The work that was planned will be scaled back to accommodate these funds.

John Ekman is still sorting stone, and requesting help in this effort, for the exterior stone wall. Progress is being made but slowly.

We are still trying to obtain quotes for the lumber, spindles and railings for the front steps. We haven't been able to contact the gentleman who did the spindles for the interior steps. We will look for another source. We have one bid on the lumber for the stairs of \$7,000 which does not include railings or spindles.

Dominic Pappalardo suggested a work party after Goldfield Days to help patch the roof. He believes that we can take care of a lot of the leaks. The school needs a new roof but hopefully a few patches will help until we reach that point. There's a lot of work that needs to be done before we can think about replacing the roof. But it would be nice to eliminate some of the many buckets inside the school.

Goldfield Days – Goldfield Days are fast approaching - August 5, 6, & 7. The Koepnicks are working hard on their GPS challenge. They have obtained business support from the community and will be setting out more prizes this year. Alan Metscher will be leading the popular historical bus tours. We're going to have a couple of tours of the high school and hopefully the classroom will be ready with our desks, windows and blinds.
