High School Update -The Goldfield Historical Society (GHS) and our Structural Engineer, Mel Green, are developing a Scope of Work, including plans and specifications for this work, so that the contractor can submit a cost estimate. This will allow us to submit the Scope of Work and Preliminary Budget to the State Historic Preservation Office, generating a Funding Agreement and releasing the grant funds to begin the project. This has taken longer than expected, but we're close. In the meantime, we have done some very necessary patching on the sloped roof.

Sam (Pam) Kirchner, of Pahrump, has donated an early toilet to the Society. It had been carefully caredfor by her mother for many years. It is of the late Victorian/Edwardian period and would have been of a type found in more expensive homes in boom era Goldfield.

NRHS Grant – Since receiving the grant from the National Railway Historical Society (NRHS), we have started removing the hardware from the T&G Railroad boxcars that needs to be duplicated. **Bill Beltz** graciously removed the pieces that we need. Thank you so much **Bill.** We will be taking those to a foundry to be made. The next step is to have the missing doors built and painted.

The chair of the NRHS Heritage Grants Committee sent the following:
